



The New Colossus by Emma Lazarus

Not like the brazen giant of Greek fame,
With conquering limbs astride from land to land;
Here at our sea-washed, sunset gates shall stand
A mighty woman with a torch, whose flame
Is the imprisoned lightning, and her name
Mother of Exiles. From her beacon-hand
Glows world-wide welcome; her mild eyes command
The air-bridged harbor that twin cities frame.
“Keep, ancient lands, your storied pomp!” cries she
With silent lips. “Give me your tired, your poor,
Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free,
The wretched refuse of your teeming shore.
Send these, the homeless, tempest-tost to me,
I lift my lamp beside the golden door!”



When Lazarus wrote this poem in 1883, immigrants were entering the United States in great numbers, including Italians, French, Greeks, and Russian-Jewish refugees, among others. And sure enough, “The New Colossus” is an Italian sonnet written by a Jewish-American woman, celebrating a statue forged in France, contrasting it with one in ancient Greece.

This new colossus, Lazarus insists, is “not like” the Greek Colossus, domineering and male, which in the third century BCE stood at the harbor of the island of Rhodes, like some conquering warrior and guardian. No, this statue holds a beacon in her hand, signaling nothing less than “world-wide welcome.” Her name is “Mother of Exiles.” She is unarmed, a light in one hand and a votive tablet in the other. Such tablets were common in ancient Greece for


inscribing prayers, or in any case aspirations - and on this particular tablet is the date the United States formally broke from English rule: July 4, 1776. It's as if she says, *We aspire to be free - now come, all you who yearn for freedom.*

She is herself the personification of freedom, of course, the Roman goddess Libertas. But compare her with Eugène Delacroix's 1830 painting, *Liberty Leading the People*, in which Libertas carries a battle flag and gun. No, this version of Libertas is an image of peace and hospitality. In the decades since the poem's writing, including recent days, American "nativists" (so-called!) have sought to recast her as a guard keeping people out. But Lazarus' poem stands as a ringing rebuke to this idea. This isn't the old colossus, but rather a new one: far from keeping people out, Lady Liberty, that "mighty woman with a torch, whose flame / Is the imprisoned lightning," is welcoming us in.

Resources to Combat Racism

In the past five weeks, since the murder of George Floyd, our country seems to have gone through an awakening about the racism that continues to plague people of color and especially black people in America. For those of us who are white, we can't know firsthand how our black brothers and sisters experience racism in any and all of its forms. Yet as followers of Jesus, we are called to love our neighbors as ourselves and this means to listen to the cries of our neighbors and to their stories, and to acknowledge and take on their suffering as our own.

For myself, the first step in doing this has been to educate myself and so I have been dedicating a good amount of my shelter-in-place time to learning as much as I can about what racism looks like, how the systems in our society work and the stories of those destroyed by those systems, about our history and how what happened back then connects to where we are now, and to unpacking my own ways of thinking and interpreting that blind me from seeing what is really going on.

For the past few weeks, both Pastor Dawn and I have been reading books, watching movies and videos, and listening to podcasts and have gathered a list of resources which we offer to you now. Our hope is that you will use this list to begin your own research into all the many aspects of this issue; how it manifests itself in the world and how it infects our ways of seeing the world. This is not easy work and it can and most likely will get uncomfortable at times but the goal is not to make anyone feel uncomfortable or guilty. Rather, the goal is to get us to a point where we can see the issues clearly and can then begin to move toward solutions which will create a more equitable society for everyone; a nation in which all can experience abundant life.

Council Highlights

From your CLC Church Council's online meeting on June 17th:

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, the CLC building remains closed. Council continued discussion of how and when in-person worship may resume; this could potentially start outdoors. Although public worship is technically permitted based on San Mateo's revised directive in June, the county health officer has continued to urge caution. The guidance of June 17, 2020 states in part, "**Gatherings of any size outside of a single household or living unit remain discouraged because they carry significant risk of exposure to COVID-19.**" At this writing, there is a clear uptrend in COVID-19 cases in California and other states. Online worship and events continue through Coastside Lutheran Church Facebook page and website coastsidelutheran.org, and we expect to continue an online presence even after in-person worship resumes. We are in discussions with Iglesia del Mar about the possibility of allowing them to use the facility on a limited basis and with a written agreement on limitations and procedures during the pandemic, depending on further public health developments.

Thank you again to our givers! We continue to see encouraging levels of giving under the circumstances, allowing us keep our programs running. Your continuing contributions matter!

Book Sale: Noting a desire to protect our own volunteers as well as members of the public, and given the uncertainties of the COVID-19 situation, the council decided to cancel the used-book sale for this year's Labor Day weekend. We are not collecting book donations at CLC at this time but Ink Spell Books is accepting donations through their back door at 500 Purissima St, Half Moon Bay. Three 2020 graduates, from HMB and Pilarcitos High Schools, have received their \$1,000 scholarships from our 2019 Book Sale and Iglesia del Mar's fundraisers.

Finances: We successfully obtained a **CARES-PPP** loan through Wells Fargo. This will replace \$30,500 of lost income in 2020 and is 100% forgivable if used for payroll/utilities under the federal SBA recovery loan program. Many thanks to all who helped with this, especially Bill Nelson, Bill Strom, Pastor Dawn, Pastor Sue, Jim Casey, and Larry Hebb. Council reviewed and approved a summary statement of total compensation for each pastor for 2020. The PPP loan provides us a much-needed lifeline for 2020, with CLC finances being impacted by loss of rental and fundraiser income, as well as lower-than-anticipated overall giving. As circumstances evolve, we will be planning carefully for the 2021 budget.

Facility: Since completing sidewalk repairs, we are pursuing step-by-step work on the West Wing and hope to start with dry-rot repairs in July, followed by flooring and other projects.

Looking ahead: Recognizing that it may be quite some time before we can gather in-person for a congregational meeting, the council is discussing the possibility of conducting an online/dial-in meeting in August—details to be announced.

Staying connected: Council members are continuing to reach out to members and friends of CLC to see how they are faring during sheltering and to ask for their input regarding our online programs and future worship plans. Please continue to let us know your thoughts!

CLC Garden is buzzing!

Even in the midst of pandemic, abundant life is bursting forth from GroundSwell, the CLC community garden. Garden manager Peter Masters and community friend Amanda have continued to work the garden throughout the spring and summer (observing proper social distancing of course!) They have installed a drip irrigation system which has definitely made taking care of the garden easier while also conserving water. Prior to the pandemic, our confirmation students helped plant strawberries and open up some new beds. Now the garden is producing all sorts of produce including: lettuce, kale, celery, leeks, broccolini, basil, dill, cilantro, strawberries, and of course zucchini! The garden also has other friends who come out and help care for it and the food is available for people who help with the work and for anyone who needs food to eat.

This past week, a colony of honey bees in search of a new home were attracted to the abundance of the garden and decided to stay. Initially they started to build a hive in a bush near the labyrinth but thanks to the quick thinking (and bravery!) of one of CLC's newest community friends, Jonathon, they have been relocated. After doing some research on YouTube on how to move a bee hive, Jonathon and Amanda cut the branch where the bees were building their new hive and put it in a box. Our resourceful gardeners contacted a beekeeping organization which provided them with a proper beekeepers hive box which is now located in the back of the garden. Our bees are now happily buzzing around the garden pollinating the flowers and we are happy to provide a home for this threatened yet vital link in the ecosystem.

\$2,904 is the average weekly amount required to meet the approved Contributions budget for 2020 (\$151,00/52).
 \$2,478 is the average weekly Contributions amount received in May 2020.

Notes:

1. Giving in May was \$12,391 (5 Sundays) compared to May 2019 (4 Sundays) giving of \$11,318.
2. Giving in May was \$1,700 under budget, and rental/other income was \$204* under budget.
3. To-Date our total income is \$15,688 under budget and expenses are \$4,503 under budget making our net budget deficit to-date \$11,185. That deficit combined with the structural 2020 budget deficit of \$1,731, gives a net loss (income – expenses) of \$12,916.
4. Monthly income exceeded expenses by \$1,256* which is less than the budgeted surplus of \$2,014 for May.
5. Current equity is \$1,644* compared to the April 30 equity of \$510, and January 1 equity of \$14,559.

We provide compassionate, non-judgmental pastoral care, care of the soul, counseling, referrals, and crisis intervention to anyone in any kind of distress, every night of the year between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 4:00 a.m. The Sierra Pacific Synod is blessed to accompany this organization in mutual ministry as we proclaim God's creative, redeeming and sanctifying love in our synod.

We will continue to review finances and update prior to our next congregational meeting. It’s difficult to relay a full real-time picture of our financial status, but I want to try: our original 2020 budget envisioned contributions of \$3,000 per household on average, or \$250 per month. Charitable Contribution Incentives

The CARES Act encourages individuals to contribute to religious and other charitable organizations by creating a new “above the line” deduction (i.e. for taxpayers who take the standard deduction). This deduction will permit them to deduct up to \$300 of annual monetary contributions. The CARES Act also increases the limitations on deductions for charitable contributions by individuals who itemize, as well as corporations. For individuals, the 50% of adjusted gross income limitation is suspended for cash contributions made in 2020. Please consult your tax advisor for your specific tax situation.
